Quantum key distribution networks interworking- Protocol framework

1 Scope

This Recommendation specifies a protocol framework for signalling aspects of a quantum key distribution network interworking (QKDNi), especially the following areas:

- Overview of signalling and protocols for QKDN interworking
- Signalling requirements for QKDN interworking
- Protocol suites for QKDN interworking.

NOTE – QKD protocols which perform between QKD modules of interworking QKDN through QKD links are outside the scope of this Recommendation.

3 Definitions

3.1 Terms defined elsewhere

This Recommendation uses the following terms defined elsewhere:

- 3.1.1 **information theoretically secure (IT-secure)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: Secure against any deciphering attack with unbounded computational resources.
- 3.1.2 **key management** [ITU-T Y.3800]: All activities performed on keys during their life cycle starting from their reception from the quantum layer, the storage, formatting, relay, synchronization, authentication, to supply to cryptographic application and delete or preserve depending on the key management policy.
- 3.1.3 **key manager (KM)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A functional module located in a quantum key distribution (QKD) node to perform key management in the key management layer.
- 3.1.4 key manager link (KM link) [ITU-T Y.3800]: A communication link connecting key managers (KMs) to perform key management.
- 3.1.5 **key relay** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A method to share keys between arbitrary quantum key distribution (QKD) nodes via intermediate QKD node(s).
- 3.1.6 **key supply agent (KSA)** [ITU-T Y.3802]: A functional element to supply keys to a cryptographic application, being located between a key management agent (KMA) and the client.

NOTE - Application interfaces for cryptographic applications are installed into the key supply agent (KSA). The KSA synchronizes keys, and verifies their integrity via a KSA link before supplying them to the client.

- 3.1.7 key supply agent-key (KSA-key) [ITU-T Y.3803]: Key data stored and processed in a key supply agent (KSA), and securely shared between a KSA and a matching KSA.
- 3.1.8 **quantum key distribution (QKD)** [b-ETSI GR QKD 007]: Procedure or method for generating and distributing symmetrical cryptographic keys with information theoretical security based on quantum information theory.
- 3.1.9 **quantum key distribution link (QKD link)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A communication link between two quantum key distribution (QKD) modules to operate the QKD.

NOTE – A QKD link consists of a quantum channel for the transmission of quantum signals, and a classical channel used to exchange information for synchronization and key distillation.

3.1.10 **quantum key distribution module (QKD module)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A set of hardware and software components that implements cryptographic functions and quantum optical processes, including quantum key distribution (QKD) protocols, synchronization, distillation for key generation, and is contained within a defined cryptographic boundary.

NOTE – A QKD module is connected to a QKD link, acting as an endpoint module in which a key is generated. These are two types of QKD modules, namely, the transmitters (QKD-Tx) and the receivers (QKD-Rx).

3.1.11 **quantum key distribution network (QKDN)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A network comprised of two or more quantum key distribution (QKD) nodes connected through QKD links.

NOTE – A QKDN allows sharing keys between the QKD nodes by key relay when they are not directly connected by a QKD link.

- 3.1.12 **quantum key distribution network controller (QKDN controller)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A functional module, which is located in a quantum key distribution (QKD) network control layer to control a QKD network.
- 3.1.13 **quantum key distribution network manager (QKDN manager)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A functional module, which is located in a quantum key distribution (QKD) network management layer to monitor and manage a QKD network.

3.1.14 **quantum key distribution node (QKD node)** [ITU-T Y.3800]: A node that contains one or more quantum key distribution (QKD) modules protected against intrusion and attacks by unauthorized parties.

NOTE – A QKD node can contain a key manager (KM).

6 Overview

A quantum key distribution network (QKDN) [ITU-T Y.3800] is a cryptographic infrastructure to provide secure symmetric keys to cryptographic applications in user networks. The functional requirements and architecture of a single QKDN are specified based on the functional requirements of QKDN in [ITU-T Y.3801], functional architecture and operational procedure of QKDN in [ITU-T Y.3802].

When constructing a large scale QKDN which covers a wide area, it may consist of multiple QKDNs interworking each other. In this regard, the overview of QKDN interworking (QKDNi), the reference models, and the functional models of gateway functions (GWFs) and interworking functions (IWFs) are described in [ITU-T Y.3810]. [ITU-T Y.3813] describes the functional requirements for key management layer, QKDN control layer, and QKDN management layer, for interworking using gateway nodes (GWNs) and/or interworking nodes (IWNs). Furthermore, [ITU-T Y.QKDN-iwac] specifies functional architecture as well as operational procedure for QKDNi.

This Recommendation describes a framework of signalling requirements and protocols for QKDNi. Various kinds of protocols can be used in a QKDNi. This Recommendation specifies a framework of signalling requirements and protocols for key management layer, QKDN control layer and

QKDN management layer. Protocols for quantum layer which are performed between two QKD modules are outside the scope of this Recommendation.

Based on the conceptual models on QKDNi illustrated in [ITU-T Y.3810] and the QKDNi functional requirements identified in [ITU-T Y.3813], two functional architectures for QKDNi with GWNs and IWNs are specified in [ITU-T Y.QKDN-iwac].

7 QKDNi with GWFs

7.1 Reference model for QKDNi with GWFs




Figure 1 – Reference model for QKDNi with GWFs defined in [ITU-T Y.3810]

Figure 1 shows a reference model for QKDNi with GWFs which is defined in [ITU-T Y.3810].

7.2 Functional model for QKDNi with GWFs




Figure 2 – Functional model for QKDNi with GWFs




Figure 3 – Reference model for QKDNi with IWFs defined in [ITU-T Y.3810]

Figure 2 shows a functional model for QKDNi with GWFs. QKDN managers are added to Figure 3 in [ITU-T Y.3810] to indicate the Mxi reference point.

The following three reference points are identified between GWFs.

- Kxi is a reference point for interworking of key management layers: When keys are relayed between QKDN providers through the key management layer, relative information for this purpose should be communicated, such as source KMA ID, destination KMA ID and key relay time stamp, etc.
- Cxi is a reference point for interworking of QKDN control layers: Control information of QKDNs can be shared between QKDN providers through the QKDN control layer, such as routing control, session control, access control and QoS policy control, etc.
- Mxi is a reference point for interworking of QKDN management layers: QKDN management information can be shared between QKDN providers through the QKDN management layer, such as charging information.

NOTE 1 – Cxi interface optionally supports interworking of key relay routing. Key relay routing will perform independently in each QKDN according to policies of each service provider.

NOTE 2 – Mxi interface optionally supports interworking of management functions between service providers. Management information on fault, configuration, accounting, performance, security (FCAPS) can be exchanged at Mxi interface.

NOTE 3 – Qx is a reference point for interworking of quantum layers without GWFs. When QKD-keys are shared between QKDN providers through the quantum layer, a QKD protocol such as BB84 will be performed through Qx interface. This reference point is defined in [ITU-T Y.3802].

NOTE 4 – Interworking of quantum layers might involve interoperability between QKD modules with different QKD protocols and implementations, which still need further study. The details are outside the scope of this Recommendation.

8 QKDNi with IWFs

8.1 Reference model for QKDNi with IWFs

Figure 3 shows a reference model for QKDNi with interworking functions (IWFs) which is defined in [ITU-T Y.3810].

8.2 Functional model for QKDNi with IWFs




Figure 4 – Functional model for QKDNi with IWFs

Figure shows a functional model for QKDNi with IWFs. QKDN managers are added to Figure 4 in [ITU-T Y.3810] to indicate the Mxi reference point.

NOTE 1 – Figure 4 shows that the QKDN manager-A and the QKDN manager-B connects directly through the Mxi interface. If IWFs for QKDN managers are accommodated in the IWN, QKDN manager-A and the QKDN manager-B will connect to the IWFs for the QKDN managers in the IWN through the Mx interface. (See figure 3)

The following two reference points are identified in IWN.

- Kxi' is a reference point for interworking of key management layers in IWN.

NOTE 1 - Keys can be transferred between KM-A and KM-B through Kxi' within the secure operational environment of the IWN (trusted node).

NOTE 2 - Parameters which are transferred at Kxi' is the same with them at the Kxi. Kxi' is not necessary to be encrypted because it is internal interfaces within a trusted node.

- Cxi' is a reference point for interworking of QKDN control layers in IWN.

Editor's note –*NOTE 2 will be reviewed and discussed further. Information transferred through Kxi' and Cxi' will be reviewed and discussed further.*

9 Signalling requirements

This clause specifies signalling requirements of each reference points specified in [ITU-T Y.3813].

Table 1 summarises information which is transferred at each reference point.

10 Protocol suites and stacks


This clause specifies protocol suites in QKDN. Appropriate protocols can be selected for each reference points and network interfaces.

Appendix I

Signalling procedures

(This appendix does not form an integral part of this Recommendation.)

1. Signalling procedures of key relay for QKDN interworking with IWN

Figure I-1 and Figure I-2 show typical signalling procedures of key relay for QKDN interworking with IWN.

Figure I-1 is the case of key relay from a distributed QKDN (left side) to a centralized QKDN (right side). The distributed QKDN performs case 2 of key relay schemes which is defined in [ITU-T Y.3803] in the Figure I-1.

- 1) The source cryptographic application sends "Key request" message to the KM A-1 in the QKD node A-1, where is the nearest node of the source cryptographic application.
- 2) The KM A-1 in the distributed QKDN sends "Key relay next hop request" message to the QKDN controller in the QKD node A-1, and the QKDN controller A-1 responds "Response to key relay next hop request" message with the next hop destination for key relay, then the KM A-1 relays keys along with the response.
- 3) The KM A-2 and the QKDN controller A-2 in the QKD node A-2 performs the same procedures as the KM A-1 of the QKDN node A-1.
- 4) When the key reaches the KM (shown as the KM A-3 in the figure) in the IWN for interworking to the QKDN with the destination cryptographic application, the KM A-3 sends "key transfer" message to transfer the keys to the KM B-3.
- 5) The KM B-3 sends "Key relay request notification" message to the QKDN controller in the centralized QKD, and the QKDN controller B-1 responds "key relay request" message with the full key relay route to the destination node.
- 6) The KM B-3 starts key relay along with the key relay route in the centralized QKDN. The KM B-3 sends "Key relay" message to the KM B-2.
- 7) The KM B-2 in the QKD node B-2 sends "Key relay" message to the KM B-1 in the QKD node B-1.
- 8) When the key reaches the destination QKD node which is the nearest node to the destination cryptographic application, the KM (shown as KM B-1 in the figure) sends "Key relay completion notification" message to the KM in IWN (shown as the KM B-3 in the figure), then the KM B-3 sends "Response to key relay request" message to the QKDN controller B-1.
- 9) The KM B-3 in IWN sends "Response to key transfer" message to the KM A-3, and the KM A-3 sends "Key relay completion notification" message to the original KM (shown in KM A-1 in the figure), then the KM A-1 responds "Response to key request" message to the source cryptographic application with keys.
- 10) The source cryptographic application sends "Key ID notification" message to the destination cryptographic application with key ID.
- 11) The destination cryptographic application sends "Key request with ID" message with key ID which is received from the source cryptographic application.
- 12) The nearest KM (shown as KM B-1 in the figure) responds "Response to key request" message with keys.




Figure I-1 – Typical signalling procedures of key relay in QKDN interworking from distributed QKDN (left side) to centralized QKDN (right side)

Figure I-2 is the case of key relay from a centralized QKDN (right side) to a distributed QKDN (left side). The centralized QKDN performs case 1 of key relay schemes which is defined in [ITU-T Y.3803] in the Figure I-2.

- 1) The source cryptographic application sends "Key request" message to the KM B-1 in the QKD node B-1, where is the nearest node of the source cryptographic application.
- 2) The KM B-1 sends "Key request notification" message to the QKDN controller B-1 in the centralized QKDN.
- 3) The QKDN controller B-1 sends "Key reservation request" message to the KM B-1 to reserve keys which are shared with the KM B-2, and the KM B-1 responds "Response to key reservation request" to the QKDN controller B-1.
- 4) The QKDN controller B-1 sends "Key relay request" message to the KM B-2 with the full key relay route to the destination node, and the KM B-2 starts key relay along with the key relay route in the centralized QKDN. The KM B-2 sends "Key relay" message to the KM B-3.
- 5) When the keys reach the KM (shown as KM B-3 in the figure) in the IWN for interworking to the QKDN with the destination cryptographic application, the KM B-3 sends "key transfer" message to transfer the keys to KM A-3.
- 6) The KM A-3 in the IWN sends "Key relay next hop request" message to the QKDN controller in the IWN, and the QKDN controller A-3 responds "Response to key relay next hop request" message with the next hop destination for key relay, then the KM A-3 relays keys along with the response.
- 7) The KM A-2 and the QKDN controller A-2 in the QKD node A-2 performs the same procedures as the KM A-3 of the IWN.
- 8) When the key reaches the destination QKD node which is the nearest node to the destination cryptographic application, the KM (shown as KM A-1 in the figure) sends "Key relay

completion notification" message to the KM in IWN (shown as KM A-3 in the figure), then the KM A-3 sends "Response to key transfer" message to the KM B-3.

- 9) The KM B-3 in IWN sends "Key relay completion notification" message to the KM B-2, and KM B-2 sends "Response to key relay request" message to the original QKDN controller (shown in the QKDN controller B-1 in the figure).
- 10) The QKDN controller B-1 sends "Key allocation request" message to the KM B-1, and the KM B-1 responds "Response to key allocation request" message to the QKDN controller B-1.
- 11) The KM B-1 responds "Response to key request" message to the source cryptographic application with keys.
- 12) The source cryptographic application sends "Key ID notification" message to the destination cryptographic application with key ID.
- 13) The destination cryptographic application sends "Key request with ID" message with key ID which is received from the source cryptographic application.
- 14) The nearest KM (shown as KM A-1 in the figure) responds "Response to key request" message with keys.




Figure I-2 Typical signalling procedures of key relay in QKDN interworking from centralized QKDN (right side) to distributed QKDN (left side)
